Ugbrooke House has been the family seat of the Clifford family for over 400 years. In the mid-18th century the house was remodelled by Robert Adam and the gardens by Capability Brown. Both are well worth exploring. There is also a very impressive chapel that is still in use.

Transport:

By car: Take the A30 road from Exeter, then the A38 and A380. Turn off at the

slip road at Olchard Ideford Dip (GR 50.59, -3.58). Turn left at the

junction, and continue for 1 km to Ugbrooke.

By bus: There is an hourly bus service (no. 7) from Exeter bus station. For

instance, the 10.50 am bus gets to Olchard Ideford Dip (the next stop after Kenn) at 11.17. Cross the A380 and then walk NW for 1 km to Ugbrooke House. Return buses run hourly, at a quarter to the hour.

Monday 26 July 2021: Visit to the Gardens at Buckfast Abbey

On this visit to Buckfast Abbey, we shall have a conducted tour of Buckfast Abbey Gardens. At Buckfast there are spacious lawns and three specialist garden areas: a Lavender garden, a Physic garden, and a Sensory Garden. Everywhere there are specialist trees which give a magnificence and splendour to the grounds.

- 12.00 (Optional) Lunch those who wish to do so can have lunch or snacks in the Grange Restaurant, which commands spectacular views of the Abbey and the surrounding countryside.
- 2 pm Conducted tour of the gardens. The head gardener is both knowledgeable and enthusiastic, so this should be a very interesting tour. There will be a charge of £3 per head.

The Abbey and grounds are usually open from 10 am to 4 pm. Please note that the Abbey will be closed to visitors between 12 and 12.30, when it is only available to those attending Mass. There are also three interesting shops nearby.

Transport

By road: Buckfast Abbey is half a mile from the A38, and mid-way between Exeter and Plymouth. There is ample free parking at the Abbey.

By bus: From Exeter Bus Station there are two alternatives. The No. 7 bus at 9.50 am gets to Newton Abbot at 10.45. Then take the 88 bus at 10.50 am, which gets to Buckfast Abbey at 11.22 am. The return buses are at 38 minutes past the hour. Another option is to take the X38 bus at 9.30 am towards Plymouth, and get off at Station Approach, Buckfastleigh, at 10.20 am. From there it is a half-mile walk to the Abbey at Buckfast. The return bus to Exeter runs every two hours.

Monday 6 September 2021: River Tamar cruise

Join us for an idyllic cruise to experience the stunning scenery of the Tamar Valley. Setting sail across Plymouth Sound and up the River Tamar to the picturesque Cornish village of Calstock. Leaving the busy city behind we pass the Naval Dockyard and Brunel's famous bridge, taking in the beautiful sights of the Tamar Valley, passing Cargreen, Wier Quay, Pentille, Holton and Cotehele.



The 5-Hour Cruise comprises a two-hour cruise to Calstock, with a one hour stop-over – a chance to stretch your legs and walk around the quaint Cornish village - before returning to the vessel for the two-hour return journey. There is small licensed bar on board, with some snack food. At Calstock, the 17th Century Tamar Inn can serve light snacks, or more substantial food if booked in advance (Tel. 01822 832 487).

Dog Friendly – Dogs are allowed on all Daytime Cruises & Ferries, but must remain on their leads at all times.

Timings of the sailing: Depart Plymouth 2.30 pm. Arrive Calstock 4.30 pm

Depart Calstock 5.30 pm. Arrive Plymouth 7.30 pm

Departure point: Tamar Cruises Landing Stage, near the Mayflower Steps.

Please remember to bring your facemask.

Cost of cruise: £19.50. Payment can be made:

- a) **on the day** at the Ticket Pavilion located directly in front of the Landing Stage where all the trips depart. It is recommended that you arrive at least 15 minutes before the scheduled departure time, or

Travel to Plymouth:

- **1. Train:** Trains leave Exeter St Davids every 20 minutes. Journey takes 1 hour. 20-minute walk to the landing stage.
- **2. Bus:** The X38 leaves Exeter at 9.30 and 11.40, and takes 1½ hours to Plymouth. 15-minute walk to the landing stage.
- **3. Coach:** Falcon Coaches go every hour from Honiton and Sowton Park & Ride. The journey takes one hour. 15-minute walk to the landing stage.
- **3. Car:** The nearest carpark is at Lambhay Hill (£9 for more than 5 hours), but the larger Elphinstone Car Park a little further away is the preferred choice (£3.50 for 6 hours).

News from the campus

Student accommodation

In the last issue we mentioned that the University had submitted proposals for the development of the Clydesdale, Nash and Birks Grange Village halls of residence on the Streatham campus. That plan received overwhelming support at a meeting of the Exeter City Council Planning Committee on 27 May. Despite a number of objections from the public, the proposal was approved by 10 votes to 1.

The proposal would see the demolition of the existing Clydesdale and Nash Grove buildings – built in the later 1980s and early 1990s – and the construction of new student accommodation buildings, ranging in height from three to eight storeys. It will result in a net increase of about 1,200 student bedrooms on the campus.

Did you know?

In 2020 there were about 27,000 students at the University of Exeter, of whom 22,000 were full-time. There were almost 21,000 students on the Streatham campus, 3,700 at St Luke's, and 2,700 at Penryn. Overseas students numbered about 5,000, and they came from over 150 countries.

The professional staff number about 6,500, of whom 1,000 are engaged solely in research, 1,200 combine teaching and research, 1,300 do teaching only, and 3,000 provide professional services. Some staff are part-time, so in terms of full-time equivalents, the university employs about 5,000 full-time staff.

The University's total income in 2019/20 was £478 million, with over half of that (57 %) coming from tuition fees and education contracts. Almost 20 percent came from research grants and contracts, 11 percent from funding body grants, and 12 percent from other income, including a small proportion from investment income and donations.

News from the city

Swimming pools

The St Sidwell's Point leisure centre, near the site of the old bus station, is about to open its doors. Construction is complete, and they are putting the final touches to the outside. It will contain, among other things, a state-of-the-art Passivhaus swimming pool. Also opening soon is a new bus station alongside, which should make bus travel much more pleasant, especially in winter time. With the old bus station, bus travellers were exposed to the elements while waiting for their buses.

Across the city, the Riverside Leisure Centre swimming pool, damaged four years ago by fire, is finally set to reopen on 24th July. It has proved a massive job to restore the swimming pool, and its transformation has cost the City Council £5.6 million.

Local businesses

While many businesses have suffered during the pandemic and been forced to close, others have seen the lockdowns as a good opportunity to develop along new lines. Two interesting developments in the centre of Exeter concern restaurant businesses. The well-known Lloyds Kitchen, in Catherine Street, which in the past has been voted Exeter's Restaurant of the Year, has had a complete makeover. It is now a modern and elegant restaurant called Sabatini, and serves Italian food. Nearby in the Cathedral Close, a glamorous new restaurant called The Ivy has just opened in the imposing City Bank (Jack Wills) building directly facing the Cathedral. There is seating for 120 diners.
